President Price called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

It was moved by Allmaras and seconded by Benson to approve the agenda with the additional agenda items being SADD out of state travel and Recommendation to Hire - Nathan Jensen. Motion carried unanimously.

APPROVAL OF THE CONSENT AGENDA

It was moved by Myhre and seconded by Schaefer to approve the consent agenda as presented. Motion carried unanimously. The consent agenda consisted of the minutes from the March 14th, 2022 regular meeting, the March 28th 2022 special meeting, the April 7th 2022 special meeting,

the business manager report, and the bills - general fund of \$340,863.01, hot lunch fund of \$11,015.28, and the activity fund of \$9,760.03.

MONTHLY COMMITTEE REPORTS

Board Member Larson commented on the Building Committee meeting recently held. Discussion focused on the roof repair project that has been brought to the board tonight, the bus storage project, as well as other potential projects such as flooring replacement and main entrance concrete replacement.

PRINCIPALS' REPORTS

Elementary Principal Becker presented her report to the board. Quarter 4 midterm was April 8th with deficiencies to be mailed out this week. The Elementary Leadership Team held their first meeting on April 11th. This team provides a forum for students to discuss wants and needs from an Elementary student's point of view. Teacher evaluations are complete, due date was April 15th. Lastly summer school planning is underway, it will run for 4 weeks in June.

Secondary Principal Baumbach presented his report. Recently the school had worked with local law enforcement and conducted a K-9 Unit walk-through. Nothing was discovered during the walkthrough. Current Tech and Engineering teacher Molly Rzaszutak will move over to the FACS position next school year. Principal Baumbach also shared an update on the MTSS program, as a pilot of the Corrective Reading program will be coming for 6th graders. April 11

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

Louters shared her report with the board. Staff had recently visited the Lindsay Unified School District. This was the last opportunity the district had to visit as the relationship is set to come to an end this summer. Staff were able to see some new techniques as well as some that are already implemented here, reaffirming the practice, in student engagement. Transportation coordination and research continues as viable options are sought to improve or replace current challenges.

Lastly, numerous interviews were conducted for the districts open positions, with recommendations for hire being brought to the board this evening.

TEACHER REPORT

There was no teacher report this evening.

STUDENT REPORT

Student rep Amzi Meier briefly presented to the board and touched base on the meetings held with students regarding the dress code. Meier will continue with this information as the Dress Code policy is on the agenda tonight.

NATIONAL SADD CONFERENCE PROPOSAL

It was moved by Myhre and seconded by Larson to approve out of state travel to attend the National SADD Conference. Motion carried unanimously. SADD advisor Carissa Johnson presented to the board a proposal to attend the National SADD Conference in Florida July 12th-16th. Co-Advisor Jon Johnson will accompany the students. Funds will be raised to cover the students' cost of the trip, but Carissa asked that the SADD account cover some of Jon's expenses.

PERSONNEL - CAITLIN GOOD RESIGNATION

It was moved by Allmaras and seconded by Larson to accept the resignation of FACS teacher Caitlin Good. Motion carried unanimously.

RECOMMENDATION TO HIRE - ANGELA TOBIN - ELEMENTARY POSITION

It was moved by Myhre and seconded by Benson to hire Angela Tobin as an Elementary Teacher. Motion carried unanimously.

RECOMMENDATION TO HIRE - COURTNEY WIESZ - BUSINESS EDUCATION

It was moved by Allmaras and seconded by Myhre to hire Courtney Wiesz to the Business Education position. Motion carried unanimously.

POLICY FFH - STUDENT DRESS CODE

No motion was made as discussion was held regarding potential update to the student dress code. Student Board Rep Amzi Meier had recently met with students to continue discussion on updating the dress code. Mei-

er walked the board through a proposed dress code policy, and fielded questions and comments from the board. Meier will continue to work with the students and plans to bring a new proposal to the board meeting in May.

EAST CENTRAL TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

Board member Allmaras provided an update on the scheduling of the proposed East Central Mediation. No date has been finalized, but May 6th at the Federal Building in Fargo is the date being discussed at this time.

ROOFING PROPOSAL

It was moved by Myhre and seconded by Schaefer to approve the proposal from A & R Roofing as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Proposal is to replace the roof section of the main hallway from the handicap accessible doors to the main office. A & R Roofing completed a similar job above the gym entryway previously.

It was moved by Allmaras and seconded by Benson to hire Nathan Jensen to the Elementary Physical Education position. Motion carried unanimously.
