No motion required with these as both items are exhibits to previous policy. ABEB-E1 outlines how the district should process complaints regarding the child nutrition program, and ABEB-E2 features a civil rights complaint log for district front office staff to use as needed.

Policy ABEC - School Meal

Charge Policy

This required policy lays out in detail items the district already follows. These items include providing students with regular meals regardless of account balance, and proper process of collection of unpaid meal

Policy ABEC-E, ABEC-AR

No motion for this item as Policies at hand are an exhibit and regulation neither of which require such action. ABEC-E is an example letter the district can use for outstanding lunch balances. ABEC-AR gives a guideline for adult meals and pricing.

Policy DCAB – Supplementary Benefits for Staff – Activity **Pass**

It was moved by Schaefer and seconded by Price to approve the updated Policy DCAB - Supplementary Benefits for Staff. Motion carried unanimously. Only change to the policy is in the last paragraph, where it now states all staff members will receive a pass for themselves and a guest. This also includes all coaches regardless of full time employment with the district

School District Financial Report

It was moved by Alfstad and seconded by Perleberg to approve the School District Financial Report as presented. Motion carried unanimously. Outdoor notes:

*Blue-green algae could still be present in some area wetlands and lakes so watch water conditions before allowing hunting dogs into the water. It's deadly and death can occur in minutes.

*Please park out of the way of other vehicles and farm equipment on prairie roads and trails.

*Oct. 27: James Valley Pheasants Forever banquet, Club 883, Jamestown, 5 p.m.

*Oct. 28: Mink, weasel and muskrat trapping season opens. *Nov. 6: Fall crow season closes.

Fishing: *Devils Lake elevation, Oct. 17: 1,449.4 feet above mean sea level (MSL).

*Stump Lake elevation: 1,449.32 MSL.

*Lake Sakakawea elevation: 1,840.11 MSL; 17,000 cubic feet per second average (CFS) Garrison Dam daily releases.

*N.D. Game & Fish Dept. Dist. game wardens: No reports from north-central area lakes or Devils Lake. Not much activity on Lake Sakakawea although Deepwater Bay producing some walleye.

*Devils Lake, Ed's Bait Shop, Devils Lake: Try the west end of Devils Lake along the Golden Highway or Minnewaukan Flats for walleye but bite isn't real consistent. East Bay

*Devils Lake, Lakeview Lodge, Minnewaukan: Limited activity depending on weather.

*Devils Lake, West Bay Resort, Minnewaukan: Limited

reports with fewer anglers on the water.
*Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Work structure with jigs and minnows for walleye but fewer anglers on

*Foster County area lakes, Dry Dock, Carrington: Little activity throughout area lakes.

*Jamestown Reservoir, Pioneer Bait & Tackle, Jamestown: Not much activity with overall slow success throughout area

*Jamestown Reservoir, Sooper Stop, Jamestown: A few anglers on Jamestown Reservoir for fall walleye but no reports

*Lake Ashtabula, The Hungry Pelican at the Crossing, Luverne: Facilities closed due to construction.

*Lake Ashtabula, Bayshore, Valley City: Limited activity. *Lake Sakakawea, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: East end of Lake Sakakawea slow with better success farther west around New Town.

*Lakes Audubon & Sakakawea, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Not many anglers out and the east end of Lake Sakakawea remains slow with the walleye taken still found in deeper water around 40 to 50 feet.

*Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon/Missouri River, Scott's Bait and Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River tailrace remains slow during the day from both boat and shore with somewhat better success at night. Small walleye success continues in the spillway channel, however. Sort through for any keepers. East end of Lake Sakakawea slow for salmon during the day with occasional success. Look for cooler nighttime temperatures to bring spawning salmon closer to shore. Some success at night in dark hours, however. Try crankbaits from boats working top-water down to 70 feet along the face of the dam and adjacent bays. Walleye remain deep in 30 feet and deeper. Fish are a little shallower around Beaver Bay and west. Not many walleye anglers out in general, though.

*Lonetree WMA area lakes, Harvey: Little activity throughout area lakes.

Hunting:

*Deer: Somewhat slow activity but that should change once the rut begins.

*Upland: Continued fair success.

*Waterfowl: Increasing numbers of snow geese moving into northwest N.D. along with northern mallards. Migrating ducks still mostly north of N.D. Hwy. 23 but more goose numbers south of the highway. Increasing waterfowl numbers in east-central N.D., as well, but not much movement around Devils Lake and west-central N.D. Some birds moved through earlier across north-central N.D. but moved out and little northern migration in its place with mostly local birds in that area.

North Dakota **Outdoors**

The opening shots, so to stress safe gun handling and speak, of the 2023 hunting hunter safety. season officially began over two months ago on August 15 with the early Canada

goose season. If you're like many, the intention of brushing up on your swing and transitioning from fishing to shotgunning isn't as gradual as you'd like. And honestly, I won't begrudge a miss or "aw shucks" moment or two. Many hunters and anglers play softball and golf, and the transition between the two is similar to fishing and hunting. The only comparison is they both take place outdoors.

We'd all, in a best case scenario, spend a few evenings shooting clay pigeons and working out the kinks prior to heading into the field, but I know the best laid plans often are plans and not necessarily action points. I will say if you have time even in October or November, invest wisely and you'll appreciate the benefit provided through practice and preparation - shooting trap, busting clay pigeons or, for the rifle hunters, getting to the range before deer season gets here.

One area we can't afford to slip past is hunting safety reminders. August, September, October or November, no matter the month or open season, we must continue to

Whether you count hunting years spent afield in decades, years or months, the worst possible habit any hunter can fall victim to is the dreaded "It won't happen to me" syndrome. Trust me if you're reading this, I hope and pray you never are part of a hunting incident, but hoping is futile unless we practice some basic safe-

Remember, hunter safety is more important than any goose, grouse or deer. No matter how successful your hunt is or how the memories are made in the process, any accident or fatality will erase even the most notable out-
